Serving our neighbors in need for 37 years





Emergency Services 423 families served

Many of our clients this year found themselves in crisis solely due to the pandemic; we partnered with the Buhl Regional Health Foundation to assist our neighbors with an additional \$20,000 in COVID-19 relief.



Family Supportive Services 42 people served

We assisted 11 women, 11 men, and 20 children throughout the year as they learned and grew as families and became more stable, sustainable households together.

Food Program

750 food bags given per month

Our monthly food distribution list serves an average of 350 families per month. The Community Food Warehouse put together food boxes for distribution to replace our traditional food bags through the summer months.

Soup Kitchen 6,637 meals served

In the absence of volunteers, Center staff members prepared and packaged take-out meals throughout the year.

We welcomed back some of our cooks and servers in the summer!



FROM OUR DIRECTOR

2020 is in the books as a year of constant change for our community, and here at the Center we focused on adaptability, so that we could better serve our neighbors in need. We looked for ways to meet those needs safely and efficiently. We saw a 48% increase in clients seeking assistance with rent and utility payments through emergency services, and a 23% increase in meals served through our

soup kitchen, and we adjusted throughout the year to serve these populations, with the help of additional grant funding and other community support.

The Center has also seen many changes within the building, and we invite you to visit when it is safe for you to do so and enjoy our updates! The front of the building and prayer grotto also received some much-needed attention.



Bowl-a-thon Fundraiser \$9,632.55 raised

The 20th annual Bowl-a-thon took place in February and we filled the lanes! We are humbled by the support our community shows each year through this event.



Mission Thrift Store 1,351 customers served

Though we were closed for almost two months in spring and early summer, the Thrift Store made a record number of sales this year, bringing in over \$23,000 to help serve clients in our other programs.

Marjorie B was accepted into the HOPE Advocacy program in February. She lives with her two daughters, ages 14 and 6. When she came to the Center, she felt as if her life was in total shambles, and she needed help to be able to "get things in order" and maintain a more stable structure for herself and her children. She struggled with prioritizing, in part due to a history of alcohol and mental health issues. Once she joined the program, her case manager was able to connect her to mental health services and help her find resources to continue addressing her personal struggles. She was also able to enroll one of her daughters, who has autism, in supportive services; her daughter now has a TSS worker and has improved in behavior and communication as a result. Marjorie's next goal is obtaining a car and insurance, because reliable transportation will be a huge benefit in the stability of her life and her children's lives. She feels her problems and crises seem more manageable now that she knows she has a case manager she can turn to for help when things feel overwhelming. Through our calls and virtual meetings, we notice that she seems less stressed and more capable of moving forward even when struggles arise.

success stories

Mark P first came to the Center through the Emergency Services program. He had hitchhiked to our area from his former home in West Virginia, and faced several crises: homelessness, unemployment, and very few essentials (clothing, food, etc). With the help of our programs he was able to transfer his benefits to PA, apply for permanent housing, and sign up with our food pantry. Using our crisis assistance funding, Mark obtained new clothing and shoes appropriate for job searching; he found additional clothing through our Thrift Store! Mark joined the FAITH Advocacy in July. Within a week of joining the program, he received news that his son, living out of the area, had overdosed on heroin. Distraught, he reached out to his case manager for support. Both his FAITH case manager and the Emergency Services case manager were able to offer him help and resources deal with his overwhelming grief.
