# **Family Supportive Services**

In 2023, the Crisis Assistance program helped with \$16,920.00 of emergency payments toward rent, utilities, transportation, and health needs. Over 75% of our clients in crisis come to us to address imminent utility shutoffs. We also put our clients in touch with other agencies that can assist with needs outside of our programming, such as obtaining housing.



# **AWESOME Program**

The Assistance With Education, Shelter, Organization, Money management, and Employment (AWESOME) Program held 31 classes in 2023. Our most popular topic was a one-day class on Grief and Surviving the Holidays. We also held Mindful Youth classes in collaboration with the Buhl Club, Mercer Co. Behavioral Health, and the Buhl Regional Health Foundation. The AWESOME program distributed \$12,851.00 in stipend awards to our participants this year.



We distributed 11,402 bags of food last year. Families that sign up for regular monthly bags receive dry goods, canned goods, meat, and dairy, as well as fresh produce when available. As a distribution agency for Mercer County Food Bank, we strive to feed as many families as we can, both through monthly distribution and emergency food bags.



# Soup Kitchen

In 2023, we served hot take-away meals on 92 days, averaging 189 dinners per service day. This is a 57% increase in meals served, and we anticipate even higher numbers in 2024. These community meals have no income requirement and no other restriction; anyone wishing to feed their family is welcome to come through our doors.

### FROM OUR DIRECTOR

Whew, what a year 2023 was!

On behalf of the staff of the Center, the Board of Directors, and Catholic Charities Inc., thank you for your continued support. I am honored and humbled to have had a small role in celebrating the 40 years of Sister Benita's vision to assist those in need in the valley.

In February, one of our local senior housing high rises had a fire, and all of its residents had to evacuate. We assisted 20 of these displaced residents, temporarily housed in our local hotels, with clothing, hygiene products, and food. Some of the hotel rooms did not have microwaves, and in collaboration with other local agencies and churches, we were also able to provide hot meals to these

residents. The outpouring of care from our community, and the gratitude we received from the residents in return, reminds us of the importance of coming together to help our neighbors in need whenever we can.

We could not continue the mission and work at the Center without such a responsive community. The last several years have brought our neighbors new, unexpected challenges, and Prince of Peace Center has grown and changed to rise to meet them. Truly, the good work at the Center could never be accomplished without the kindness and the willing hands of our neighbors.

success stories

Joshua A. is a 41-year-old homeless man from Erie. He came to a shelter

in Mercer County, and was denied due

to active drug use. A caseworker from

the shelter brought Joshua to Prince of

Peace Center, where he worked with

**Crisis Intervention Specialist Lisa** 

McCoy. Together they reached out

via phone to several recovery centers

and other shelters. They finally found

success with Oil Region Recovery, an

agency in Franklin. While he waited for a caseworker

from that agency to arrive, Joshua received new clothing and personal hygiene items from our other Center

programs. He let our crisis specialists know several times that he had never

received this level of assistance before

while trying to reach out for help.

He said, "I'm used to being told call

here, call there, and that's it." Having

someone make calls and connect him

to resources he could not have reached

before was new and very

touching for him.

Serena B is a 23-year-old single mother to a one-year old son. She came to the

Center for assistance when her son

became ill due to lead poisoning, as a

result of lead in the home. When she

met with our crisis intervention team,

Serena reported that the hospital and

health department were conducting an investigation on her rental property. She felt she needed a new place to live as soon as possible. However, her work hours were cut, and she missed work days taking her

son back and forth to the hospital. As a result, she was also behind on utility

payments in her current home; she

was able to catch up on all payments

except for the electric bill. Through

our Crisis Assistance program, the

Center paid the bill in full, and she

was very grateful for the help. This

payment allowed Serena to focus all of

her efforts on finding safer, affordable

housing for herself and her son.
